Oblivia Sleeps Group Work

What will it take to wake humanity to the climate crisis before we are engulfed? The rubbish included in this work is only a fraction of that washed up every day on our beaches. This work embodies a sense of impending doom, a feeling of knowing that something life threatening or tragic is about to occur. Climate anxiety can be overwhelming and debilitating, causing us to turn away, close our eyes to the present danger and fall into an uneasy slumber of inaction.



Oblivia Sleeps is a group work created by members of Studio Forrest forming a central piece of the group installation based on the theme of Earth Mother. Inspired by the connection to place that the theme Strata represents, we are one shared across the many layers of time, connected and affected by that which goes before.

Medium: Recycled and found materials, wire, paper, locally sourced cob (unfired wild clay and sand) and beach combed waste.

Danu

Gillian Brew

Celtic goddess of nature, fertility, wisdom and magic, Danu is referenced in folklore as the mother of the Tuatha Dé Danann (Children of Danu), demigods and fairy folk of legend. She calls to me from my ancestors and emerges through me from the earth. Danu embodies birth, the divine feminine, nurturing, grounded and powerful yet not seeking power. Ephemeral in nature, she weathers and returns to the earth in an endless cycle, whispers layered within the strata of times past, waiting to be reborn.

Gillian is an artist and member of Studio Forrest, living and creating on Gadubanud and Gulidjan country in the Otways.

Medium: Cob (unfired wild clay and sand) over a wicker frame, recycled and found materials.

Euridice Catriona Ebeling

This figurehead 'Euridice' references women who remain onshore, yet search seaward for their seafarers' safe return. From the sixteenth century onwards, figureheads offered protection to seafarers from hazardous seas and safeguarded them home.

But alas!!! Euridice drowned and now endlessly roams the seabed of Louttit Bay, enticing surfers onto rocks and listening for tales from sea creatures as they journey along the coastline.

The sunken vessel and breaking waves are sculpted from recycled materials and mixed media (wire, fabric, linen threads, enamel paint, plastercloth, foam, wood, removable coachscrews).

Catriona Ebeling, an artist with Studio Forrest, grew up in Warrandyte and now lives in the Otways.

The Motherhood Mirror deb garland

Mothers: the source of life, love and nurturing. The Motherhood Mirror symbolizes mothers as a reflection of those around them – partners, family, community. Values, behaviours, and expectations are absorbed within themselves.

The Motherhood Mirror represents part of deb's current artistic practice, encaustic painting/ sculpture. deb merges photography, encaustics and mixed media to unique and highly tactile works. Viewers are encouraged to look into The Motherhood Mirror and to (gently) touch the wax while reflecting on their interpretation of the artwork.

deb gARTland is an award-winning photo encaustic (hot wax painting)/mixed media artist who lives and works in the Otway Ranges.

Navel Gazing

My figure represents a bent crone, weighed down by life and the weight of bureaucracy we all struggle with on a daily basis.

The figure is woven in a convoluted random weave structure, nothing straight or clear but following a circuitous and often illogical path.

She gazes at her own belly trying to make sense of the tangle that is her form.

This work was inspired by the frustration I felt at the many hoops I have to jump through almost daily to perform even the simplest of tasks, tasks which used to take but a few minutes to organise are now accompanied by a tangled mass of logic defying red tape and paperwork.

Materials: rattan, rafia, twine

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Throughout time, humankind has described its visceral connection to place via the Earth Mother.

In this work titled "Meraki", Otway artist Kylie Pollock has used wire to articulate her presence.

During its manufacture, wire is melted, cast, cooled, heated, rolled, stretched, and wound. These are some of the same intense forces in nature which formed and re-formed our earth.

This work seeks to connect the viewer to the Earth Mother who implores us to care for this place.

"Meraki" = A Greek word describing the ability to wholeheartedly and lovingly imbue something with the essence of yourself.

Mother Eagle & Earth Mother both represent creators of life, and the physical & spiritual connection between heaven and earth.

Mielikki, Finnish Goddess of Forests and The Hunt, is weeping. Her tears of blood mourn the loss of ancient forests – a failure of Mortal Rangers to protect and preserve the wilds and animals as part of their home and family.

As intelligent beings we can live in harmony with the wild without the destruction of one in the name of the other. But have we? Mechanical giants clear felling, to satisfy the mortal needs of fire and home, serve to fuel Mielikki's tears.

Jan Verouden is primarily a glass artist living and creating in the Otways.

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Honora Selina Selkie Mother

This stump, chosen for its elongated & curving appearance, lent itself to a tail with 2 breasts indicated by removed branches.

Selkie Honora, a textile sculpture; woven and stitched Cassytha and yarn arms cradle her upcycled wool knit seal pup. Her crocheted and stitched face and hair utilize found materials, natural and inorganic. A random crocheted shawl inspired by a letter in Trent Dalton's "Love Stories", highlighting the power of many small actions to potentially save and promote Life and Love. Sealskin tail incorporates stitched fabric and NZ flax seeds.

Magical mythical woman carries my story in her fabric.

Medium: Textile
